ican Standard Version (4%). The New Revised Standard Version, Christian Standard Bible, The Message and American Standard Version each received 1%.

- The Center for the Study of Religion and American Culture reports 4 out of 5 Americans read the Bible once a month. Nine percent read it every day.
- If you read 150-200 words per minute, it will take 70 hours to read the Bible through. Reading one hour a day will cover the entire Bible in 10 weeks. If you read 11 1/2 minutes a day you will go through the Bible in a year.

ASK GOD'S FORGIVENESS, AND FORGIVE OTHERS



The person on the other end of the phone identified himself as the state coroner. He asked the woman who answered to come identify a body he believed is her brother. Upon arriving, she was led into the morgue and confirmed the body as her younger brother. The coroner explained that he was working in a quick mart when a group in their twenties came in and shot him five times. They murdered him for the thrill of it.

They were caught and convicted of multiple murders in several states. The reporter got in touch with the woman and wanted to know what she thought about the people that had executed her brother in cold blood. Her answer stunned the reporter, "I forgave them," she said. That woman is my mother, her attitude of forgiveness had a profound and liberating effect on me.

My mother had experienced a child-hood filled with anger, lies and violence. Although she had a religious upbringing, she didn't understand forgiveness. She dusted off her family Bible and started to search the Word. Her fingers stopped at the passage "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). The key word in that passage was "all". All had sinned against God and that included her. Mother began to search for how to get right with God.

Her search led her to Acts 2:38, where she read: "Repent and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit".

My mother knew she had to turn away from all the hurt, anger, violence and lies from her upbringing, and follow the Bible teaching to please God.

She came across this Scripture: "Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind" (Romans 12:2). She learned that God could change the way she felt. Gradually, "the peace that passes understanding" filled her heart (Philippians 4:7). She was able to forgive the killers of her brother.

Seek God's forgiveness for yourself.

On October 3, 1918, Major Whittlesey and more than five hundred of his men were trapped behind enemy lines. The men found themselves in a small ravine taking on heavy fire. By the second day of battle only two hundred men remained. From a distance the American artillery started sending big artillery rounds in an effort to help the shrinking army. Without exact coordinates the rounds began to fall dangerously close to the men in cover, threatening to wipe out all of what was left with friendly fire. Their only hope was a single pigeon which was their source of the archaic communication. The pigeon flew with a simple petition strapped to its leg and amazingly missed every bullet that was directed its way. The message read: "We are along the road parallel to 276.4. Our own artillery is dropping a barrage directly on us. For heaven's sake, stop it." The bird delivered the message and Major Whittlesey and his men were saved that day!

Today, communication has come far. We all attest to its advantages. We must never forget the most advanced communication we have, the communication with God in Heaven.

This is a dangerous world in which we live. Spiritually speaking, it is not much different than the battle Major Whittlesey and his men faced on that day in 1918. As a matter of fact,



it seems that the harder you try to do good, the more open you are to enemy attacks. Scripture says that "the days are evil." What are we to do? Communicate with God! Pray to be saved from the darkness of this world.

When we are pinned down in the dark ravines we must remember to send out our petitions to the only One that can truly protect us. LIVE A GODLY LIFE

In making a new year's resolution, why would anyone resolve to "live a godly life"? If a "resolution" is an "intent" to do something, or a "commitment" or "promise" to fulfill, is it arrogant to commit to be God-like? Is it just a wild promise that will frustrate me because I cannot achieve this goal? How about a compromise to just "live a good life"?

To sort out questions such as this, we must see what the Bible states and consider some practical aspects of making it our intent this year to live a godly-life. First, living a "good life" or being a "good person" is only one element of a godly life. One way to look at this is to say that all godly people are good people but not all good people are godly. "Good" is readily pictured as being honest, treating one's neighbor fairly, keeping one's word - all of the characteristics that are not "bad". What makes the difference between just being a good person and being a godly person is being converted to Christ. One prime example from the Bible is that of Cornelius. Cornelius was indeed a very good person – but it required his being baptized with water to become a godly man (Acts 10:1-44).

With one being converted to Christ, a second aspect of a resolution (to live a godly life) can be more readily understood. Jesus encourages, even commands His disciples to live a godly life. "You ought to live holy and godly lives as you look forward to the



day of God..." (2 Peter 3:11). "Godly" means to have the qualities and characteristics that Christ/God have. Impossible? Not at all because God Himself empowers those in His family, His church. He gives His children His Spirit to live in them. Romans chapter 8 has a thorough discussion of how the Spirit works in the life of a Christian. Galatians 5:19-26 contrasts the sinful, bad life with that of one who has the Spirit living in him.

Thus, the short answer to how does one keep a resolution to live a god-ly-life is: (1) to be converted to Christ and (2) to continue to mature spiritually. "Make every effort to add to your faith goodness, and to goodness self-control" (2 Peter 1:5-9). You get the idea – it takes effort, work to keep any resolution and especially one to live a godly life. But you and God working together can accomplish this worthy goal!

Perhaps you have resolved this year to share that which is the very essence of your being — your faith. Adding to your resolve is the knowledge that Jesus is the only way to God (John 14:6) and that people will be judged by God.

May I make these suggestions to help you meet your goal in 2016:

Pick out one person with whom you would like to share the gospel.

Pray for an opportunity to speak to that person in a setting that would be conducive to sharing your faith.

Pray that God would work on that person's heart so that he/she will be receptive to the gospel.

Start a conversation that would lead to a spiritual discussion as well as a serious search of the scriptures. Questions relative to a person's understanding of who Jesus is or that would make someone consider his own eternal destiny can go a long way.

Repeat steps 1-4 with someone else.
